They also host a toy drive at Christmas that benefits all of the local Children's Hospitals and Ronald McDonald Houses in the Raleigh/Durham/Chapel Hill area. In 2023, Smiling While Sending Hope started offering caregiver and family outings throughout the year to provide a safe space for everyone to gather and feel connected. At the North Carolina 4-H Congress, they partnered with our youth for a large no-sew blanket service project for around 200 folks. On the second day, they also made cards and more blankets.

Over the summer, Honor Club and NC 4-H members put our hands to larger service for Little Pink Houses of Hope, a Burlington, NC based nonprofit that provides free, week-long retreats to families affected by breast cancer. Honor Club members had the opportunity to participate in this service at Honor Club Conference, where attendees banded together to make 19 cards and 18 bracelets to gift to the breast cancer patients who receive these retreats. At 4-H Congress, 4-Hers learned about Little Pink Houses of Hope at the citizenship & civic engagement session. Together, 4-Hers made 23 cards and 53 bracelets to gift to the retreat recipients. All together, Honor Club and NC 4-H members made enough gifts to send cards to four retreats and to send bracelets to seven retreats.

Together, we can make a difference in the lives of those who need it most.

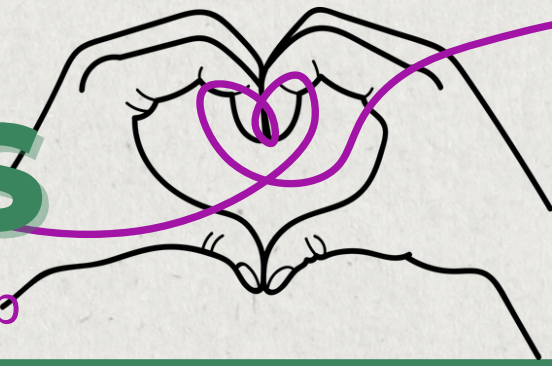

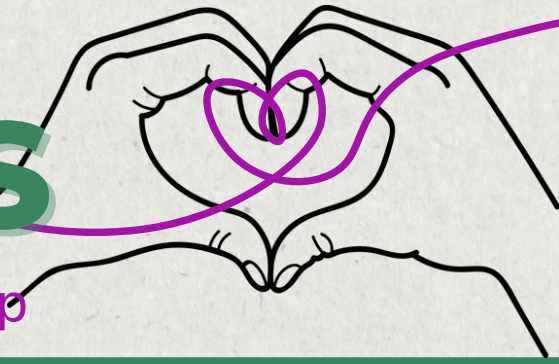
Passions

UPCOMING OPPORTUNITIES

Call for volunteers: NC State Fair

This year, the North Carolina State Fair is once again providing NC 4-H with a presence in the Educational Building, offering both 4-H youth and adults the opportunity to staff the 4-H exhibit area. Our team will be available to answer questions about the 4-H program and share its story. The Fair will run from **Thursday, October 17 to Sunday, October 27, 2024**. We are excited to showcase over 500 items in various categories, including Crafts, Entomology, Photography, County Exhibits, Hay Bales, and Livestock. This is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the 4-H Youth Development program and its impact.

We are seeking **two to three registered 4-H youth and one adult** to work each time block during the event. A single county group will staff each shift and must include an adult who is either a parent or a 4-H Online-approved volunteer. We ask that all participating youth and adults wear a 4-H shirt that represents their county, program, or another aspect of their 4-H experience. We know you and your 4-H members have plenty of 4-H apparel!

Volunteers will be assigned a 3-hour shift, during which they will engage with fair visitors, discuss the 4-H program, and share their personal 4-H experiences. We encourage participation from 4-H members, volunteers, county staff, alumni, camp staff, state staff, and more.

You will be stationed in the 4-H Crafts Area, with a designated spot for your group. **The NC State Fair will provide an entry pass for each volunteer working a full 3-hour shift, as well as one parking pass per shift. Please note that the parking pass must be returned at the same location where it was picked up at the end of the day.** Carpooling is highly recommended as we can only issue one parking pass per shift due to limited availability. Passes can be picked up and returned at a designated NC State building near the fairgrounds, as in previous years.

Do not share these links outside of our registered 4-H & Extension family.

Once you open the Excel sheet in Google Drive, you will find a separate tab at the bottom for each day of the Fair. Depending on your screen size, you may need to scroll to view all the tabs. Please refrain from deleting any entries unless you made them, and do not add any new tabs.

To sign up, select the tab for the day you wish to work and enter your available time. Shifts are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis, so please only modify your own entries. The schedule begins on Friday, October 18th.

I will provide detailed instructions and information before your scheduled shift.
